As another warm and unpredictable winter winds down, we continue to celebrate our 50th year as a nature center and preserve. One of the ways we're celebrating is by offering 50 hikes for 50 years that means in any given week there is a free guided hike with a staff member or other natural resources expert. I can think of no better way to celebrate

other than to get outside and observe and learn about the current state of our preserve. And of course, we have a lot more to offer as the year continues. Please investigate what programs might interest you and join us for some nature fun.

NATURE CENTER & PRESERVE

We have several projects that have been carried over since last year.

We're still anticipating amazing work on the Forget-Me- Not Creek re-meander project. Currently, the creek is a straight-line ditch. The re-meander will enhance habitats for all wildlife that uses it. Creating more complex microsites for fish and enhancing the overall quality of the area, in addition to improving water quality downstream, is the outcome we aim to meet. Our other large undertaking is to rebuild our popular Cattail Trail that takes us out to the West Twin River. We look forward to a new and slightly wider boardwalk. We will be working with WisCorp to conduct the bulk of the removal and installation. WisCorps's mission is to develop leadership, self-confidence, and a strong work ethic in youth and young adults through the active stewardship of Wisconsin's communities and natural resources. They are a perfect fit.

Introducing Land Manager, Max Kornetzke

grew up in Kiel, Wisconsin and now live in Manitowoc with my partner and two cats. I studied Painting and Printmaking at the University of Wisconsin -Madison, graduating with a Bachelor of Fine Arts in 2018. I became enchanted by the native plants and ecosystems of Wisconsin after moving back home from Los Angeles in early 2020. I found that moving back after a period away gave me perspective and a beautiful new appreciation for the lush forests and grasslands here. I began to want to know the names of every plant I encountered on my hikes, and started to diligently study Wisconsin's online herbarium, iNaturalist, and other field guides. I also began a new creative passion: my gardening journey.

Exploring the world of prairie and habitat restoration from enthusiasts online, I settled on the years-long task of converting my family's yard to a matrix of native prairie plants. I started out buying plants from native plant nurseries but ended up finding great satisfaction from collecting and growing plants from seed myself. My love for native plants urged me to find a path in the direction of land management, and I was lucky enough to find an amazing local opportunity to be a restoration intern here at Woodland Dunes in 2023. I worked with an amazing cohort of young people passionate about wildlife and restoration, where we together planted over 1,500 trees and shrubs and treated





several acres of invasive shrubs across the preserve. I am excited to continue my journey helping to protect and enhance the unique habitats here on the preserve as a full-time staff member of Woodland Dunes.

The Butterfly & Bee Garden

We are delighted to announce that this winter, the Dorothy R. Star Butterfly and Bee Garden became part of the Rosalynn Carter Butterfly Trail. Our garden is one of only two public gardens in Wisconsin on this trail. The trail originated with Mrs. Carter, when she became aware of the environmental challenges that exist for pollinators, particularly butterflies. With the help of her friend and neighbor, Annette Wise, she created her own private garden as a haven for butterflies—especially monarchs. She and Annette then encouraged friends throughout Georgia to add their gardens to the trail, and from there it has spread across the country. The mission is to bring awareness to the habitat that butterflies need and the conditions in which they will be able to flourish. While special attention is given to monarchs, the idea of native host and nectar plants for all pollinators is encouraged. One of our garden founders, Greg Scheuer, learned about the existence of the trail just after Mrs. Carter's death in November, and encouraged us to add the Star Garden to the trail. This spring when you visit our garden, please notice the plaque announcing our participation in this very special trail. You are encouraged to do whatever you can in your own yard to help pollinators in our area. Phenology Tracking

Spring is right around the corner, bringing a variety of animals returning to spend the warmer months here with us again. One of those species can be seen right around the Nature Center building, as well as throughout various parts of our preserve - osprey!

Based on our phenology data, the osprey that nest near our building consistently return the first week of April. There are several nest platforms nearby that they can use. A pair often chooses a nest platform located directly above the West Twin River - talk about a room with a view! Those osprey do not have to go far for food, as they eat a diet of around 99% fish. Osprey have a few adaptations that help them catch their fishy prey, including closable nostrils for diving into the water as well as reversible outer toes to help hold onto slippery fish! They're unique-looking raptors, brown with a white breast and head, and a black wrist that can be seen from below. They also have a dark-colored mask across their golden-brown eyes. Osprey are one of only six land-bird species that can be found worldwide, on all continents except for Antarctica.

Once April arrives, a good place to spot one of these awesome raptors is right along Cattail Trail or from the Observation Tower, too!

Bernie, Winnie, & a Seventh Grader

I first met Bernie (Brouchoud) when I was a 12-year-old, seventh grader at Mishicot Elementary. As seventh graders, we spent three days at Camp TaPaWingo learning about nature and the invertebrates in the East Twin River. Winnie Smith was my teacher, and she set up that Bernie would have his nets out at TaPaWingo to show us how birds are captured and banded.

I had conversations from time to time with Bernie throughout the years. When I started writing my outdoor column, Scoping the Great Outdoors, many people didn't realize I was blind, so they would email me photos of birds to identify for them. Instead of telling people I was blind, I just emailed them over to Bernie and he would tell me what kind of bird it was. When I got back to the people, I explained that I was blind, but I had Bernie identify them for me.

I did stories through the years for Bernie like I still do from time to time for Woodland Dunes. I didn't talk to Bernie real often, but when I did, it was like talking to a long-time friend. I always liked the natural science that both Bernie and Winnie taught, probably because I was outside and doing something fun and interesting.

When I was in high school and Winnie thought I should learn something new, I would sleep overnight at her house, and we would be on the beach the next morning to see the sun come up. And you guessed it, Bernie would show up there too.
