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FROM THE DIRECTOR

As November ushers us into the colder, darker months of December and January, I find myself drawn to the comfort of soup-making and hearty meals. This season also invites a period of introspection and quiet contemplation—best enjoyed by a warm fire, with a loyal dog or two curled up nearby. Looking back on our fifty-first year, I am deeply grateful for the meaningful interactions and connections we have formed with our community and beyond.

We continue to grow and settle into our addition to the nature center, which is now five years old. Over the past year, we published an annual report, made substantial updates to our website, and hosted two significant fundraising events: the ninth and final Tropical Blast, and the third annual fall heiknbrew. We expanded our educational programming, offering more opportunities than ever before for both children and adults. Additionally, we made notable progress on two multi-year projects: the Forget-Me-Not Creek restoration and enhancements to our cherished Cattail Trail boardwalk, with both projects together totaling approximately \$1.25 million.

Our commitment to conservation remains strong, as we continue to improve and enhance the diverse habitats within the Dunes. This is accomplished through careful management of invasive plant species and the planting of understory plants, shrubs, and trees. And if you have not visited since late October, you will notice that our nature gift shop has undergone a refreshing update, some of which is highlighted in this issue.

We recently achieved a significant milestone with our Lakeshore Community Foundation endowment surpassing the one-million-dollar mark. This

growth ensures the sustainability of Woodland Dunes for years to come. Contributions to the endowment are true legacy gifts, as our policy is to only use the allowable distribution, preserving the remaining balance unless an extreme need arises. Our goal is for the endowment's distribution to support at least 75% of our salary expenses; at present it funds about twelve percent.

Several important projects are currently underway. These include two roofing projects at the Brouchoud Field Station, as well as soffit, fascia, and insulation

replacements on a storage building that suffered significant damage from wildlife. We also plan to update the Little Wings Play Area by replacing a worn fence and removing a large ash tree, affected by the emerald ash borer. Additional aging boardwalks, specifically on the Yellow Birch Trail boardwalk and the Black Cherry-Trillium Swale crossing, require attention. The Yellow Birch Trail is in the process of being dismantled, while the Black Cherry-Trillium Trail Swale crossing will receive upgraded approaches and stabilized railings in the coming year.

Another ongoing process is the search for our next development director. We are eager to welcome someone who can help broaden our connections both within our community and beyond. Our goal is to have the new Development Director join us in January. As February arrives and the days begin to lengthen, we look forward to renewed optimism, marked by the running of sap and the emergence of skunk cabbage.

Thank you for your continued investment in nature and for being a vital part of our journey!

Habitat Management

Throughout September and October weekly invasive species removal volunteer opportunities were held. With the help of seven volunteers, there were a total of 42 volunteer hours worked throughout September and October. Together we made significant impacts on invasive thickets along our Black Cherry and Trillium Trail as we continue our efforts to enhance native habitat across our preserve.

This winter we will continue to do more invasive species work, shifting our focus to our Bugler Preserve. Our goal is to knock back the barberry and honeysuckle in and

around our new deer enclosure this winter. We're making sure to focus our treatment in the dormant season so we have as little impact as possible on the native bumblebees that forage amongst the shrubs during the spring and summer. When the temperatures are above freezing, this can be a very effective time of year to make a big impact, with minimal bugs to pester us.

Looking onward to 2026, we will be wrapping up one of our larger US-Forest Service grants. In the spring we will be planting an additional 600 bareroot trees across the preserve. Some of these trees will replace

trees that didn't survive their first few seasons in previous planting projects, so we can make best use of cages that are out in the preserve already and in good condition. Others will go along Willow & Goldenrod Loop in areas where we have knocked back invasive buckthorn.

In the next few months we will also start our process of hiring next year's summer interns. We're planning to hire three to four interns for the summer, whose focus will be removing and treating invasive species across the preserve.

The Butterfly & Bee Garden

The aesthetics of yard culture have imbued in many of us the desire for neat and tidy perennial beds that are free of leaves and last year's growth. But these elements, left in place, can help provide important, localized habitat for our native pollinators as well as visual interest in our landscaping. For those who may be reluctant to embrace a fully wild looking aesthetic, a balance can still be struck that provides habitat and aesthetic balance in your yard.

Leave the leaves. One year when I was first introduced to the ideas of native gardening, I tried leaving all the wet leaves on the lawn. As winter carried on, it refused to snow and most of those leaves quickly dried and blew all over the neighborhood. I imagine some neighbors were unimpressed with my attempt at being more nature-minded. I then decided that I don't want to annoy all of my neighbors, but I also want to provide some much needed urban habitat. I now do a few different things with those leaves.

I will rake and haul some to an area protected from winter winds and create habitat brush piles. These piles will usually have larger logs and branches organized around the perimeter and top to keep things in place and provide additional overwintering structure. You could try adding brick, fieldstone, or other edging to make this area look more intentional while adding fallen twigs and branches throughout the year to maintain structure.

In other places I will mow the leaves into a pile and use them as a mulch under shrubs and trees. Although this is less ideal for insect habitat, the slightly shredded leaves are much less likely to blow away and offers a practical use (mulch) for something that would otherwise end up at the local waste site. In my meadow beds, I usually leave them in place—the structure of perennials holds them through the winter. Once spring is in full swing and I am ready to cut things

back, I will rake them out and add them to the brush or compost pile.

Leave the old growth. Clipping back perennials in the fall is a standard practice that keeps things looking tidy and areas clear for next year's growth. However, the stems of perennials offer ideal habitat for overwintering insects, such as the many solitary bees native to Wisconsin.

If you're still itching to clean things up a bit before spring, leaving 12 to 18 inches of standing material can provide that much needed habitat. Otherwise, leave things be until temperatures have reached consistently above 50F, so pollinators have ample time to emerge from their slumber. I personally like to leave most areas depending on how they are looking and whether the perennials offer visual interest throughout the winter. Any materials I do cut back get added to my brush piles or compost, as intact as possible.

September through October, staff and volunteers conduct fall migration bird surveys. We count every bird we see and hear at various points across the preserve, showcasing what

species are using this land as a stopover site to rest and refuel before continuing on their journey. Though not everyone will leave, some birds stay year round. Others, like the dark-eyed juncos, stay and spend winter here

with us. This fall we had a total of 95 species documented, near the average but slightly on the higher side of our fall migration species totals.

An Accountant's
View of our Trails

For years I have walked the trails of Woodland Dunes. As the only employee who is not a naturalist my perceptions are different from my coworkers. Max discusses the specifics of a plant and I discuss the thorns that jabbed me yesterday. Jess talks of all the species of butterflies when I thought every butterfly was a monarch. I learned from Kennedy that there are many types of bees when I thought all bees were bumble bees. Sue, being our arborist (I now know that means a tree person), points out the difference in bark to help identify a tree. Though I try I still can't see the difference. . . it's all rough and brown. And now I know a Chimney Swift is a bird, not a bat.

I walk every trail every week, often more then once. It is my selfcare. And those walks give me cause to wonder about this nature stuff. I wonder why raspberry bushes fall on the path instead of staying in their own lane. Don't they know their thorns hurt? Why don't birds break a wing or get knocked about their little bird head flying around in the bushes? And really, deer? You cannot hear me walking and we almost run into each other?

It amazes me that week to week the trail looks different. Vegetation colors, flowers, and ripening fruit change rapidly. I think they know that summer is short in Wisconsin. It seems the plants start losing their colors in July. It is subtle, but I notice if I pay attention.

And the smells of nature change throughout the year. In winter the air has a crisp, clean odor. Spring smells of new vegetation. In summer the flowering plants have a variety of fragrances. Fall brings the smell of decaying vegetation. I wish I had the skills to describe in writing the smell of woods but I guess to experience it yourself is the best description.

Each trail has its interesting and special characteristics. Trillium Trail seems to



have such a variety of leaves. You should see the colors in October on that trail. The width of the trail varies throughout its path which makes it interesting. This is the trail that gives me the most thorn injuries. I rather like those bloody scrapes. Makes me feel like a true wilderness person, maybe even Jeremiah Johnson. Black Cherry joins Trillium for a time and then makes its own way. Black Cherry's bridge brings interesting frog sounds (I think they are frogs) along with a variety of birds I cannot even start to name.

Willow Trail is my favorite. It leads to the West Twin River but also is the path to Goldenrod and Horsetail trails. The end of the trail is special to me, a place that I spend with my grandkids and where I can sit on my mom's memorial bench. But to get there I walk past fields that contain a variety of flowers. Then I must go through a small area I call the Scary Section which is a narrow path with overhanging trees that block the sunlight. Reminds me of the Wizard of Oz movie.

I rather enjoy being an accountant who walks in the woods. I don't have to identify specific plants. I just get to enjoy the whole and make up my own stories about the woods. That to me is selfcare.

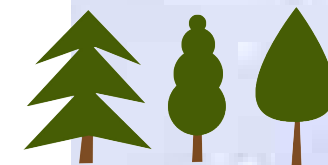

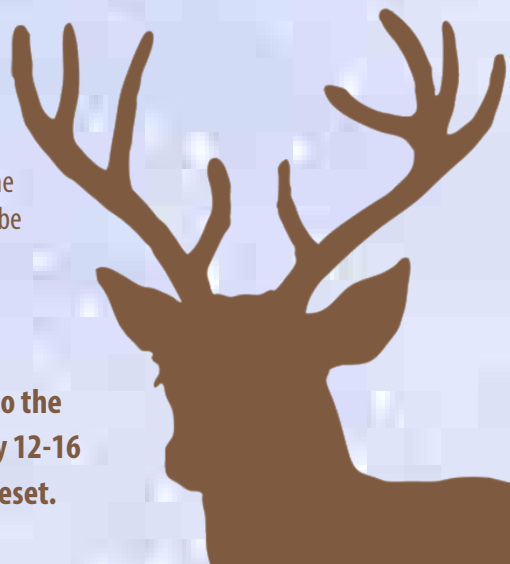

CATTAIL TRAIL BOARDWALK UPDATE

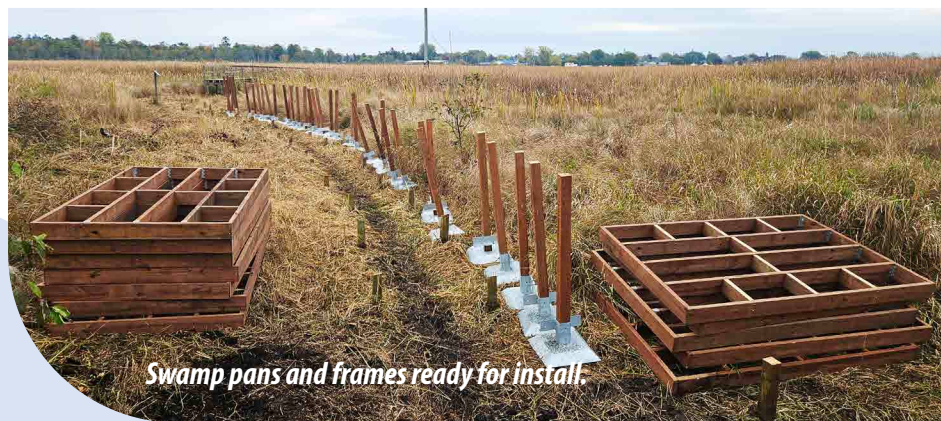
We are nearing completion of the replacement project for our 40-year-old Catrail Trail boardwalk. The process began in September last year, when a WisCorps crew removed 500 feet of aging boards and installed an equivalent length, which will be accessible to visitors in 2025. During October and through mid-November 2025, two WisCorps crews continued with the effort, extending the boardwalk nearly to the kayak launch and providing access to the West Twin River.

This year's phase required crews to work over greater distances for both removal and installation, as well as to contend with significantly softer and muddier conditions. Throughout the entire project, we used swamp pans to support the boardwalk instead of posts driven into the ground. The swamp pans, combined with adjustable braces, allow for more efficient future maintenance.

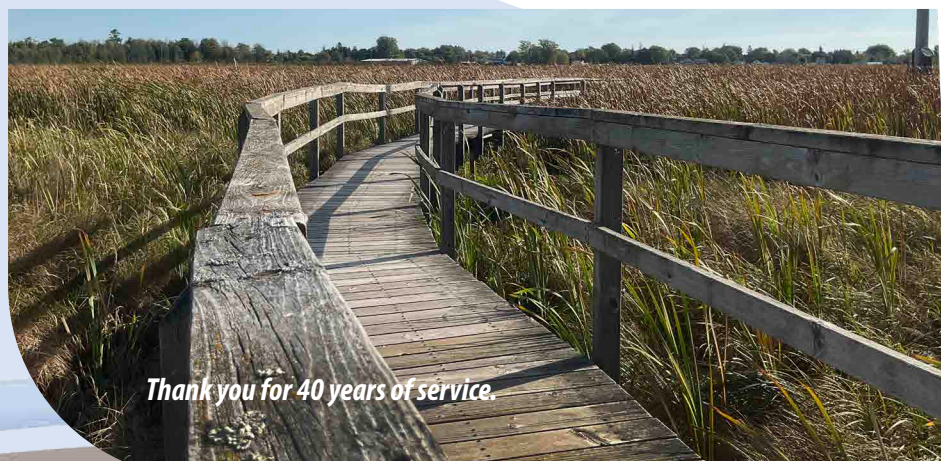
